"From Antarctica to Mars:
The Search for Life"

Christopher McKay, Ph.D., is a Planetary Scientist. He received his degree in AstroGeophysics from the University of Colorado in 1982 and has been a research scientist with the NASA Ames Research Center since.

His current research focuses on the evolution of the solar system and the origin of life. He is also actively involved in planning for future Mars missions including human settlements.

early 2001. Nor about the evolution of the species— spoken to in early 2002. McKay wants to learn how it *all* started. He seeks to find the primal organisms and to deduce how they began. Where to look for answers? He also asks, "Are we alone?"

To conduct this research he looks into hostile environments: where it is cold and dark, where there is little light to support any life. His thesis is that it was a tough environment at the beginning, very much so. If he can find microorganisms in these places there is a story to be learned.

So far he has found living creatures in the toughest of places he can find on earth: the dry deserts of Antarctica, beneath deep ice in 'almost' completely dark ooze. But, maybe the answers are not on this planet. The closest reasonable neighbor is Mars, because of its known chemistry. He has put a lot of thought toward how we might explore there and what might be found. If similar organic material is on Mars, was the origin from Earth? From another star? Where and how? Come and listen to his findings and thoughts.

Around-the-World-Record Pilot Reid Dennis

San Francisco



Reid Dennis is an ‘adventure capitalist’! His success as founder of an early Silicon Valley venture-capital firm has allowed him to explore the world in exciting ways. He shared his 1997 around-the-world tandem flight on the Amelia Earheart 60th Anniversary journey: a Lockheed Model 10E had been rebuilt with the help of Pratt Whitney and was being piloted by Linda Finch over an equatorial route similar to the 1937 ill-fated Earheart attempt. Only three of these craft were produced; this was one of the two remaining. Reid flew his HU16B Albatross as a companion aircraft and, most importantly, as an airborne photographic platform. The slides he showed were stunning.

In thirty-one legs, N44RD rounded the world to the east; the log total was 26347 nautical miles. The longest stretch was its last, from Honolulu to Oakland, a distance Amelia Earheart had flown as the first person to do so. Alas, not on her last trip.

Reid showed a photo of Howland Island, her destination never made. On a brilliant clear day it appeared as a narrow stiletto in the endless sea. In the more harsh weather reported in 1937, it would have been nearly invisible until upon it. Fred Noonan, rated as among the best navigators in the world, was using celestial tools on a stormy day to reach this one-mile-long bit of sand more than a 2500 miles from take off. Reflecting as a very careful pilot, Reid believes the nose-heavy Lockheed’s design details would have been fatal in a crash landing at sea. He feels that, after 20 hours of exhaustive flying, this was the fate of the 1937 flight. It is the most direct explanation.

Dennis’ Albatross is a wonderfully outfitted aircraft. He showed details of adapting the wing to optimize two designs of the Navy versions. Pictures of the interior showed a comfortable working space for the long flights; they were in the air for 193 hours circumnavigating the world. N44RD was the first amphibian to do so!

For taking photos, the aircraft was superb. Several slides took your breath away. Good reasons: the plane flies low and slow, and the midway hatches open wide in flight. There is little air turbulence, so the photographer or movie maker has a spectacular open view and stable platform. There is also ample room for the nominal nine-passenger load. The rear sky dome allowed use of a satellite phone from the air— photos were sent to Hartford, CT (Pratt & Whitney’s home base) for immediate publication and web site use.

The evening’s presentation was peppered with details and humor and stories of the logistics of such a trip. Most enjoyed by intrigued explorers.

Item 1: Scholarship Programs and Fund Raising

We have an inactive education scholarship program that was started in memory of Dan Reid. We gave two small (\$750 or \$1000) scholarships in 1997. In 1998 we gave \$1,000 to an expedition that was recreating the voyage of the Kon Tiki (not an education scholarship, but a donation from the chapter.) Since then, we have recovered from our financial difficulties somewhat and for the past two years have supported a Tibetan girl so she can go through middle school (see page 4 for a recent report)

We proposed to develop a Fund Raising and Scholarship Committee. To date, the members are:

Other members are welcome to join, and those who knew Dan Reid will be encouraged to get involved and reinvigorate this effort.

The main Committee efforts will be to:

- Review available information on the Dan Reid Memorial Education Scholarship Program and evaluate its relevance in light of the time lapse. Propose changes to the purpose and/or name to make it relevant to the current interests of the chapter.

- Determine the tax considerations of fund raising and the granting of scholarships.

- Set up an application process to find deserving scholarship candidates.

- Develop fund raising efforts, including, but not limited to, raffles at

the dinner meetings, an annual silent auction, mailing solicitations, etc.

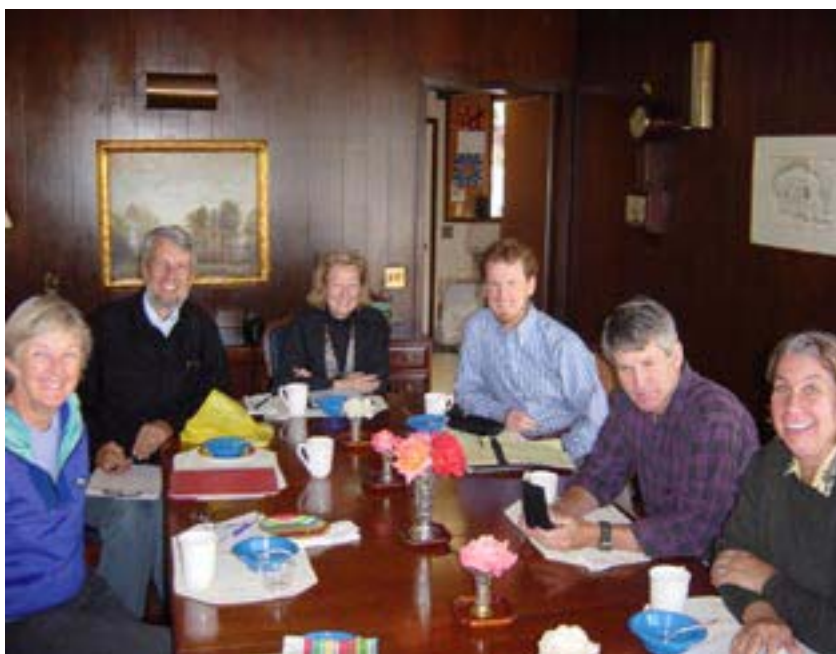
Committee members will have occasional meetings prior to the main dinner meetings and will announce these in the newsletter and/or to an e-mail list.

Item 2: Tax Exempt Status of Chapter Activities

The discussion on fund raising opened up a discussion about our tax-exempt status and whether the New York status would cover our efforts. Tom Hall volunteered to draft a letter to the new treasurer, with copies to the Philadelphia and Washington Chapters asking about this.

Item 3: New Members and Roster

Sue Estey is putting together a roster of all members. This led to a discussion of how we can get information on new members from New York. The headquarters' staff had been



sending copies of all applications of accepted members, but that stopped after September 2001 when they were busy with WTO assistance and, then, with ECAD. We will again request information on new members.

A second issue is that we should be receiving some dues reimbursement for new members. We only received a refund for one new member since late 1999.

It was suggested that all members from the chapter who recommend new members ask the applicant to send a copy of the application to the chair.

The chair would make sure it gets to the Membership Committee who would check with New York on the status. We could help potential members put together a good application that focuses on their exploration (rather than professional accomplishments) and have applicant information for the roster, etc. when these people are accepted.

Item 4: Meeting costs; other options

Meetings are expensive, but the chapter is not making money on these. Some events are small gains, but the meetings that are small losses balance them. The wine is a benefit for overall meeting enjoyment, but it is a sizable expense. We might try a wine-free dinner for reactions.

Tom Hall suggested that we add to our meeting program by asking members to open their homes for smaller, less-formal talks. The participants would all pay \$5 or so, the host would

get buffet food, and the program would be 45 minutes or so, with Q & A. No service, everyone pitches in, but the costs are minimal.

Item 5: Bigger than a dinner smaller than a GateAway

Several members have asked for a special evening or event. A small committee will get together to see if this will be possible. A potential time for 'something' would be October 2003 – a silent auction for the scholarship program, combined with a hoopla dinner with one or two major speakers, a daylong event with some field trips followed a series of workshops, films and speakers— or something else entirely.

Right now, this is a committee of two: Lesley Ewing and Kelly Noonan. Several people (Joan Bekins, Mort Beebe, several southern California and San Diego members) have offered ideas for a big event, and they will be asked to participate in exploring big picture ideas for the event as well as doing the planning and execution of the preferred option.

The Isherwoods in China

The Isherwoods send their best to all their friends at the Club:

"Dana and I are in China now for at least a year. I'm in Beijing consulting for the China Sustainable Energy Program and studying Mandarin.

Dana is currently in Kham, distributing wheelchairs and working on the education program." On her return:

Dana spent the early Fall working for the Kham Aid Foundation in the Tibetan Region of Kham in western Sichuan Province, China. She is the Project Director of the Tibetan Girl's Scholarship Program. With the help of donors like the N. California Chapter of the Explorers Club, the Foundation sponsors teenage girls in Junior Middle Schools (similar to a U.S high school) in Kham. The girls come from poor families in farming and nomad regions. They are chosen for sponsorship based on their potential and willingness to study in a school that is often far from home.

For the past two years, the Chapter has sponsored Jiangyang Quxi in Litang, a city two-three days journey--depending on the road conditions--from Chengdu, the Capital of Sichuan Province. Jiangyang is in the second year of the three-year program. Her teachers report that she is doing well. Gille, the Headmaster of the School is a strong supporter of the Scholarship Program. He says "although the policies of the Chinese Government say that boys and girls are equal, in practice, at the local level, girls are given fewer chances." In the following letter, Jiangyang speaks of her gratitude to you, her sponsor. The Chapter's generosity will ensure that Jiangyang has the opportunity she deserves for a bright future.
